

CONCERT NOTES

Storytellers

The 2019–2020 concert season is one of vivid orchestral colors, styles, stories, and ideas. Each concert gives us a kaleidoscopic display as our musicians invite us to visualize what the music is saying as we listen. Opening Night on Monday, September 23, 8:00 p.m., makes the perfect beginning with its diversity of story and sound coalescing into a lovely whole.

Jared Miller's *Luster* treats us to what he calls the "shiny, bejeweled colors and timbres" of 90s disco music written for an orchestra. Listening to the repeating, soaring sounds, you might think of birds in flight, or feel that you can pluck the shimmering notes from the air.

The softer, sweeter sound of George Gershwin's *Lullaby* invites us into the nursery where we sense a mother rocking her baby's cradle as the strings give us a quietly repeating theme. Gershwin's iconic *An American in Paris* follows with the impressions of an American as he strolls through the streets and absorbs the atmosphere of the city. This jazz influenced symphonic tone poem

places us on the streets of the city, evoking the sights and sounds of 1920s Paris.

Turning to the music of Maurice Ravel, the orchestra begins with *La Valse*, a choreographic poem for orchestra. In a tribute to the waltz of the 19th Century, the music takes us into a castle ballroom where dancers whirl in a frenzy, as though to keep the outside horrors of the 20th Century away. There is a recognition that the world they capture inside the castle walls is no longer alive. English composer, George Benjamin, describes the music as representing the "birth, decay, and destruction of the waltz."

The concert closes with a whimsical suite of fairy tales. Ravel's *Mother Goose Suite* is an orchestral ballet that opens with a slow, precise dance evocative of a princess sleeping in a wood, moves on to the adventures of a very tiny boy, statues coming to life, a waltz with a beautiful princess and a terrifying beast, and finally the magical ending of a fairy garden.







e tabulated over 200 replies generated collectively from the online, newsletter, and evening of the concert distribution opportunities. The majority of responses came from the 60+ age group and were from Season Subscribers attending 3-4 concerts per season. Your musical genre preference was Classical, with a strong interest in Pops. You preferred receiving the newsletter by U.S. mail, but liked receiving special event information by email, and appreciated the option of purchasing tickets online. As we anticipated, and confirmed with continuing gratitude, you told us you strongly support our program advertisers. More intimate events with musician conversation were also welcome.
