CONCERT NOTES

Opening Night

Monday, October 3, 2022 – 8:00 pm Brunswick High School



Antonin Dvorak's vivacious, colorful, and somewhat mysterious Carnival Overture (1891) opens the concert in a festive setting that Brahms called "merry." Dvorak's music was written for the second

piece of a trilogy of overtures titled *Nature*, *Life*, *Love*. The Bohemian composer gives special notice to a single tambourine which plays a large role at the end of the piece.



Walter Piston's Ballet Suite from The Incredible Flutist (1938) follows complete with dances, the arrival of a circus, a flutist who charms snakes — and women, and a polka finale

set in a marketplace teeming with activity. The music is colorful, tuneful and engaging. Be sure to listen for the dog!



Amy Beach's Symphony in E minor "Gaelic" (1896), influenced by the melodies of Boston's large Irish immigrant population at the time, closes the concert. Beach, writing the

first symphony by an American woman to gain public attention, was attracted to what she called the "simple, rugged, and unpretentious beauty" of Irish music.

November Concert

Monday, November 7, 2022 – 8:00 pm Brunswick High School

Carlos Simon says he was influenced by an excerpt from Homer's *Iliad* he found in one of Beethoven's journals - "But fate now conquers, I am hers..." - as well as the fluid harmonic structure of the 2nd movement of Beethoven's 7th Symphony. The result is



frenzied arpeggios and free-flowing running passages in his *Fate Now Conquers* depicting the uncertainty of life that hovers over us. This piece was commissioned by the Philadelphia Orchestra in 2020.

A mother and son theme informs the second piece on the program in **Richard Wagner's** *Siegfried Idyll* (1870.) Originally titled *The Tribschen Idyll*, the



symphonic poem presented in sonata form celebrates private joys, domestic bliss, and the birth of a son. It has been described as a sumptuous piece of music expressing Wagner's paternal and romantic love.

Beethoven's brilliant Symphony No. 3, *Eroica*, closes the program. It is considered a milestone work of classical-style composition and marks the beginning of the Romantic period in classical music.



Gigantic in scope, the symphony covers a wealth of emotional ground thematically and launches Beethoven's creative middle period, one unrivaled for its astonishing output.

Coastal Symphony Celebrates 40 Years!

Forty years ago, a seed was planted in the Golden Isles. That seed has grown and musical premier blossomed into a offering organization excellence in symphonic music to our community. It has taken a family of musicians, donors, patrons, and volunteer board members to achieve the dream. We invite you to meet just a few of them here . . .

The Musicians

The story began in 1982 as a vision of two public school music teachers who wanted young musical students to have an opportunity to play in an orchestral setting. They helped establish the Brunswick Community Orchestra which was renamed The Coastal Symphony of Georgia in 1994, with professional conductors directing the volunteer symphony.

"I have seen the orchestra go from a community orchestra with some professional musicians to an orchestra that is fully professional today," says **Betsy Federman**,



cellist, who began playing with the CSG in 2000 and recently celebrated her 25th anniversary with the Jacksonville Symphony. "Players and the audience collectively are transported through a range of emotions and musical memories. I find this to be a healing experience."

A Youth Symphony was born under the CSG umbrella in 2005, and later became its own entity in 2013. At the same time, under the leadership of Maestro Luis Haza, the orchestra became fully professional. "We put together very difficult programs in just a few

rehearsals, but we make it happen every time," says **Jin Kim-Peña**, principal cellist. "We bring a very high quality of music to a community that might otherwise have to travel to hear this caliber of orchestra."

On Maestro Haza's retirement in 2018, Michelle Merrill, considered a rising star on the musical scene, joined the symphony as Music Director and Conductor.

"She is wonderful at preparing the orchestra, and it is a joy to play for her," Bassist **Kevin Casseday** agrees. "We've seen the orchestra grow artistically. Michelle is really making strides here."



The Symphony Board

The Symphony Board of Directors has grown to membership 20 of over community leaders who give the organization high visibility in the community. This "working board" also provides critically needed financial and volunteer resources for continuing growth. Sue Cansler joined the board in



2005 when "times were pretty desperate for the orchestra. Former symphony president Elizabeth Freyer gets full credit for leading the financial turnaround beginning in 2006." The first *Cabaret*, our signature fundraiser, was created, and Sue went on to become president of the Symphony Society from 2008-2010 and President of the Symphony from 2010-2012. "For a community our size, we are fortunate indeed to have a truly first-rate symphony - one with such a young and dynamic leader. That's why we music lovers need to stay involved."

Board members handle hands-on fundraising, marketing, and event planning responsibilities. And if you are longstanding board member Creta Nichols, ad sales.



Creta Nichols comes from a "tremendous immersion in music" at a very early age as part of a family and community in Kansas everyone participated. That love of music led her to many volunteer

positions with musical organizations in Atlanta and, with a move to St. Simons Island, the Coastal Symphony. Serving on many symphony committees, Creta took on the job of forming an ad sales team which annually exceeds its goal. "It is easy for me to sell what I really believe in," says Creta, "and my team is a group of really good people who have had huge success."
