CONCERT NOTES



Experience Masterful Moments ... when principal players from our orchestra are featured playing some of the most challenging and lovely solo works written for their instruments. The music represents German, Russian, Austrian, and Venetian composers; some of the offerings will be familiar to us, while others may open new vistas to our musical experience.

Leading the program for the first interval, we hear the rich, pleasing sound of the French horn (Aaron Brask) in a movement from a Strauss

concerto that uses the highest and lowest notes in the horn's register. It is considered one of the most demanding solo works for the horn. Remaining in the brass, we will hear a Rimsky-Korsakov's passage (Juan Zuniga) from what many trombonists consider the definitive trombone concerto. The lively *allegro vivace* will be followed by a Hummel demanding trumpet solo (Tristan Lane Clarke) that uses the wide range of the instrument. Prepare to be captivated. Next, we hear from the winds with a bassoonist (Anthony Anurca) engaging in a flurry of scales and arpeggios, showing off one of the instrument's flashiest and most virtuosic finales by von Weber. The exquisite, clear sound of the oboe (Xiaodi Liu) in a work by Marcello follows with a movement of lyrical, haunting, expressive music, and then the clarinet (Kristen Spiridon) closes out the first part of the program with von Weber in what is considered an exhibition of technique and style on the part of the soloist. Whether taken fast or slow, the piece always ends with one of the most virtuosic passages in the clarinet repertoire.

Following intermission, we are treated to the delightful *Carmen Fanta*sy for Flute and Orchestra (Les Roettges), a setting by Francois Borne based on themes from George Bizet's *Carmen*. Borne was a flutist, and his settings of *Carmen's* rich melodies combine the virtuoso's understanding of the solo instrument with a flair for the dance rhythms and passion of the opera. Spectacular arpeggios require fleet fingering and consummate breath control from the flutist.

The evening closes with an orchestral suite, based on Spanish folk melodies. Korsakov described it as "a brilliant composition for the orchestra," desiring us to listen for the timbres, melodies, and patterns that are exactly suited for each instrument. He calls this intricacy "the very essence of the composition."

This February concert will showcase our exceptional musicians both as soloists and members of the full orchestra as they give us an evening of *Masterful Moments*.

SPONSOR SPOTLIGHT International Auto Processing, Inc.



ost of us know that the Port of Brunswick is a huge port for auto imports and exports. We've seen the acres of shiny new cars parked on Colonel's Island and we've watched the cargo ships come and go.

But what happens between the cargo ships and the dealerships?

That's where the Symphony's newest Platinum Sponsor, International Auto Processing (IAP), comes in. A pioneer in vehicle processing operations on Colonel's Island for 31 years, IAP receives cars imported from the ships, then provides services required by the manufacturer. These may include quality inspections, detailing, repair of dings, scratches and paint defects incurred in transporting, even adding accessories like spoilers, wheel locks, and Bluetooth capability.

Then they load the cars onto trucks or trains heading to their next destinations.

About 40 percent of IAP's business is performing the same services in reverse for exported cars made right here in America before they are loaded onto ships bound for Europe, China or elsewhere. Two-thirds of the port's auto processing is handled by IAP.

IAP handles 1,000 to 1,200 cars each day – 400,000 vehicles a year – mostly Mercedes, Kia, and Hyundai autos, but also Honda, GM, Toyota, and Volkswagen. About 250 permanent IAP employees and 100 temporary workers daily provide the services on 350 acres of cars.

It is a symphony of logistics.

And speaking of symphonies, we are thrilled about IAP's sponsorship. "It is important to have quality cultural experiences right here where we operate, in the Golden Isles," says Don Asdell, President of International Auto Processing. "The Coastal Symphony of Georgia is a big part of that. We are proud to support these outstanding concerts."

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
THE PRESIDENT'S CORNER

At the end of its 2016-2017 Concert Season, CSG announced that our beloved Maestro Luis Haza, who has led the Symphony with distinction for the last five years, would be retiring in May 2018, and that we would begin immediately to search for a new Music Director and Conductor.

Alice Barlow, a past president of CSG, served as the Search Committee Chair. Other members of the Search Committee were: Michael Frick, Board member and Senior Partner of Hall Booth Smith

P.C, the Symphony's Music Director and Conductor's Chair; Sharon Flores, CSG's immediate past president and executive director, and Linda Muir, CSG's current president.

The Search Committee interviewed several excellent candidates from across the Southeast over several months. On November 30, 2017, we were happy to announce that Michelle Merrill had been selected to be new CSG Music Director and Conductor for the 2018-2019 and 2019-2020 Concert Seasons.
